Yet today the name of Learmont Drysdale (1866-1909) will be known to very few, even here in Tweeddale, where his family was rooted and where he himself is buried, in Peebles cemetery.


Intrigued by a memorial to Drysdale on Damhead Rigg, above Traquair Village, **Robert England** began researching the composer's life and will share what he has learned in what promises to be a fascinating Festival Lecture.

Glasgow University Library holds an extensive archive of Drysdale's manuscripts, which has been researched for us by the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. The result is the programme for this concert, consisting of chamber music, piano music and songs, some unpublished and possibly never performed before. They will be brought to life for us by students from the RCS.

'Eine kleine Nachtmusik' Unwrapped: an illustrated lecture-recital

We all know 'Eine kleine Nachtmusik', right? Well, maybe not...

Undoubtedly one of the most popular works in the entire classical repertoire, the piece presents a surprising number of unanswered questions. We don't know why Mozart wrote it, nor for whom it was composed. There is no record of any performance in Mozart's lifetime. It was written not for string orchestra (as we usually hear it today) but for five solo strings. Oh, and it originally had five movements, not four.

Musicologist Bruce Fox-Lefriche has gone back to Mozart's original manuscript and thematic catalogue, and other contemporary sources, to reconstruct the 'missing' movement and to understand how 18th century performance practice would differ from today's.

In this illustrated lecture, Bruce will reveal how Mozart's miniature masterpiece evolved and morphed into its now-familiar form. This will be followed by a complete performance of the five-movement work as you've never heard it before!

It's 75 years since the founder members of Peebles Music Club gathered to perform a series of monthly concerts for themselves and their friends. Little can they have imagined that they were laying the foundations for tonight's Anniversary Concert, for which we welcome one of Scotland's, and the world's, finest pianists.

The first half of the recital is devoted to Debussy, one of the composers with whom Steven Osborne has a special affinity - in the words of the FT, "he has Debussy's entire sound-world in his grasp". The two books of Études, 12 pieces in all, are Debussy's last major piano works and although academic in purpose are colourful, witty and inspired.

Rachmaninov's First Sonata, with its Faustian overtones, is a veritable behemoth that is not for the faint-hearted pianist. In Steven Osborne, it meets its ideal interpreter, BBC Record Review declaring "I can't imagine this being better played".

Our founders of 75 years ago would surely be gladdened to hear the legacy they have bequeathed us.

Following the unforgettable recital by Florian Mitrea in 2020, we introduce another outstanding young pianist, this time Simone Tavoni from Italy, who is already in demand as a recitalist across Europe and the USA.

His fascinating programme traverses almost 100 years of musical history from Beethoven's early masterpiece to the rarely-heard sonata by Sibelius (played here in an arrangement by Simone Tavoni himself).

In between, we hear one of Schumann's best-loved works, his set of 13 miniatures depicting childhood scenes, followed by Chopin's passionate Ballade No.3. After three lyrical pieces by Giuseppe Martucci, much influenced by Schumann, Liszt shows his gentle side in a charming little notturno-like piece. The 'forgotten' three 'Images' by Debussy were overshadowed by his two famous books of Images, and remained unpublished until 1976.

Another chance to hear a star of the future in a wideranging and intriguing programme.

'SOUNDS FAMILIAR'

Music by members of the Bach, Biber & Weiss families

From early to contemporary music, young German recorder player Tabea Debus (described by The Times as 'a charismatic virtuoso') is challenging established perceptions of her instrument. Lutenist Alon Sariel is similarly pushing boundaries and is equally at home in early, folk and avant garde music. Together, they offer a fresh and captivating approach to all they play.

In their 'Sounds Familiar' programme, Tabea and Alon bring together some of their favourite pieces, representing three great musical families of the 18th century. The brothers Weiss rub shoulders with fathers and sons from the families Biber and, of course, Bach (J.S. and C.P.E.) in a collection of works written for recorder and lute, and arrangements by Tabea and Alon themselves of pieces originally composed for other instruments.

Join these two multi-award winning young virtuosi, and hear familiar sounds with fresh ears.

The Patron's Concerts have been highlights of recent seasons, introducing our audience to some outstandingly talented young musicians, hand-picked for us by Gina McCormack. Appearances at these concerts have already led to follow-up engagements with Music in Peebles, including the Kowalski-Reyes Duo in our January 2021 recorded concert.

We are delighted that Gina will present another Young Musicians Showcase this season, for which she will again hand-pick some of the finest young musicians from Scotland's excellent national conservatoire.

Gina McCormack is one of the UK's leading violinists, having held First Violin position with the renowned Sorrel, Maggini and Brodsky string quartets. She is also a highly respected teacher, having held posts at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and the Royal Northern College of Music.

With Gina will be her regular duo partner, **Nigel Clayton** who, in addition to his career as soloist, accompanist and chamber musician, is Professor of Piano at the Royal College of Music and Visiting Professor at the North East of Scotland Music School.

Rachel Podger has established herself as a leading interpreter of the Baroque and Classical music periods and is known for her virtuosic playing, outstanding musicianship and understanding of period style, and a cheerful, warm and decidedly non-stuffy stage presence.

In this solo recital, we are taken on a journey around Baroque Europe featuring the exuberant sounds of Nicola Matteis Jr, Johann Joseph Vilsmayr, Johann Paul von Westhoff and Johan Helmich Roman. We will also hear Bach's most famous organ work in a new version for violin, arranged by Chad Kelly, in whose own new work *Phantasia*, 'the spectre of Bach as organist looms large'.

We are thrilled to be included in this Scottish tour by one of the violin greats - one of the season's hottest tickets!

Haydn The Seven Last Words of Our Saviour on the Cross

If any string quartet has earned the right to be referred to as 'legendary', it is surely the Fitzwilliam, now one of the longest-established in the world. Its repertoire ranges from the 17th century to the present, and it is one of the few major quartets to play on historical instrument set-ups.

Haydn wrote his 'Seven Last Words' as an orchestral work, to be performed in Cádiz on Good Friday 1787. In Holy Week 2023 we will hear the more intimate string quartet version that Haydn made later that year, played by one of its leading exponents. The work consists of an introduction and a brief finale, between which come seven slow meditative 'sonatas', each of which will be preceded by a spoken preface.

For believers and non-believers alike, this is sure to be a profoundly moving experience, enhanced by the inspiring surroundings of Peebles Old Parish Church.
